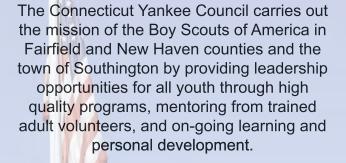

Thanks to our supporters, the 3,354 adult volunteers who selflessly gave their time and talents, and over 200 chartered organizations who partner with us in the 37 communities we serve, 2017 in the Connecticut Yankee Council was truly monumental.

Our council positively changed the lives of over 9,747 youth and their families through camping, training, and activities. We are preparing the youth we serve for life through character development programs, and leadership skills training. We attribute all programmatic success to our entirely to our caring volunteers, leaders, and parents.
