1. Program Overview & Recognition

The Connecticut Yankee Council (CYC) Unit Success Program is a strategic, performance-based framework designed to help Cub Scout Packs deliver excellent, consistent, and sustainable programming. It blends the best of BSA's Journey to Excellence (JTE) model with local CYC priorities to reward well-rounded, high-impact units.

Rewards

To encourage participation in this program the council is offering incentives for all levels a unit achieves. In order for a unit to receive the bronze, silver and gold levels unit must complete its unit renewal no later than December 31st. Recognition will be given to units by their district in February. The rewards for this program include:

4. Annual Planning & Budgeting

Planning Checklist:

Step	Description
Gather	Calendars (school, district), budget history, council events
Plan	Conduct a Pack Planning Conference with key leaders
Brainstorm	Build a list of ideal events, rank them by interest and feasibility
Finalize	Assign dates, costs, and responsibilities; publish calendar
Budget	Estimate costs for awards, camp, activities, supplies
Fundraising	; Link popcorn/hike-a-thon goals to budget

6. Retention & Engagement

Having a strong and fun program in your unit is the most important thing you can do to increase the retention rate. Focus on the program area of the success guide and retention will follow.

7. Advancement & Program Delivery

A. Track Progress Regularly

- Use tools like Scoutbook or spreadsheets to monitor each scout's advancement.
- Share progress reports with parents and den leaders monthly.

B. Plan the Program Around Advancement

- Build your pack and den calendars to naturally cover required adventures.
- Include rank-required activities in den meetings and campouts.
- Use a checklist to ensure all adventures are scheduled throughout the year.

C. Engage Parents Effectively

- Educate families early on how advancement works and what's expected at home.
- Encourage parents to help with elective or home-based requirements.
- Hold family advancement nights or "catch-up" sessions.

D. Train and Support Den Leaders

- Make sure leaders understand the advancement requirements.
- Provide leaders with planning tools and shared lesson plans.
- Host leader roundtables or mentorship from experienced leaders.

E. Set Clear Goals

- Set realistic goals like "80% of Wolves complete rank by April."
- Recognize progress and celebrate achievements create a culture of advancement success.

F. Use Pack Events Strategically

- Include advancement opportunities in pack hikes, service projects, or day camps.
- Invite guest speakers or local experts to help with adventure requirements.

G. Recognize Advancement Promptly

• Give awards as soon as they're earned, not months later.



- Hold monthly recognition ceremonies to keep motivation high.
- Use advancement ceremonies to make scouts proud of progress.

8. Outdoor Activities & Camping

Outdoor activities will keep your scouts engaged in the pack's program. Outdoor activities do not need to be elaborate in order to be effective. These activities can be as simple as a hike on a local trail or a field day competition.

Camping is a great way to engage with the outdoors. If your pack want to hold a camping event it is best to stay local. The closer you are to home the more likely your families will attend. Look at local parks and campgrounds to have your campout.

The council also offers several camping programs throughout the year which you can use to hold a camping program without having to put a lot of planning into these events. Some of the camping opportunities include: Scout Day at Lime Rock Park, Cub Scout Safari, Sr. Cub Outdoor Readiness Event, CONNJAM, and district camporees. 9. Service Projects

Service projects are another key part of our program that will instill a sense of helping others in your scouts. Service projects do not need to be a complicated project to be effective. Helping out with your chartered organization or another local organization is a great way to begin. You could also clean up a local trail. If you are looking for an indoor activity there are many organization that take handmade cards for the elderly or soldiers.

Service is part of the advancement programs for higher ranks, so having service projects lined up is essential for your unit to advance its scouts. With the exception of Eagle the service projects do not need to be planned out by the scouts and could be done in conjunction with other organizations.

Ideas:

- Park cleanups
- Scouting for Food
- Veterans ceremonies or parades
- Helping out your Chartered Organization

In order to count towards your Unit Success Points you will need to log the service hours in Scoutbook. The steps to complete this logging are:

- 1. Login to Scoutbook Plus: Scoutbook Plus is the primary platform for logging service hours and can be accessed at https://advancements.scouting.org/.
- 2. Click Activity Log on Left hand Side
- 3. Click + New Activity Log and select Service hours
- 4. Select date of Service Project
- 5. Click + Create New Activity
- 6. Enter Service Project information
- 7. Click Record and Finish

10. Webelos to Scouts BSA Transition

Creating a relationship with local troops is the best thing you can do to increase your scout's chances of moving onto a troop. This could mean that you do joint events or have den chief helping out your unit. However, at a minimum you should be in communication with local troops to make sure that all of your scouts visit them so they can decide which unit is right for them. If you do not know which troops are near your community, touch base with your district leadership and they can get you in touch with the units. You can find your district leadership by checking the district websites at https://www.ctyankee.org/districts/.

11. Leadership Recruitment and Succession planning

Your unit cannot function without volunteer leadership. Just like your unit should always be recruiting scouts, they must also be recruiting adult volunteers. We have included strategies on how to recruit adults within our recruitment guides which can be found at <u>https://www.ctyankee.org/membership</u>.

12. Trained Leadership

Having trained leader is important step in having safe and effective den and pack meetings as well as to help you with general pack administration. All of your volunteers need to complete youth protection training and position specific training, both of which can be taken online at my.scouting.org. For more advanced training there is Basic Adult Leader Outdoor Orientation (BALOO) which will give you all of the camping skills you need to succeed on a campout (A BALOO trained leader is required be at all campouts). For more advanced leadership training you should also consider Woodbadge. Information about both of these advanced trainings can be found at https://www.ctyankee.org/training-basecamp.

13. Mentorship Program (CYC-Specific)

The unit mentorship program is a new program at the CT Yankee council where a strong unit partners with a unit that is struggling to help them get better in areas they are struggling with. This
